I. Call to Order

Chairman Bob Warden called the Jacksonville Urban Area MPO Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) Meeting to order at 3:30 pm on Thursday, May 12, 2022, at the Jacksonville Station –1300 N Marine Blvd and via teleconference.

II. Welcome and Introductions

Chairman Bob Warden welcomed everyone to the TAC meeting and thanked everyone for their attendance in person and via teleconference. Additionally, he introduced Laura Wisecup, the new Transportation Planner from JUMPO.

III. Adoption of the Agenda

Chairman Bob Warden asked for a motion to adopt the agenda as written.

Mr. Paul Buchanan made a motion to accept the agenda as written. Mr. Royce Bennett seconded the motion to accept the agenda as written.

The agenda was accepted unanimously by the Committee members present.

IV. Public Comment

There were no public comments in person, audio or virtual.

Action Items

V. March 10, 2022, Meeting Minutes

Chairman Bob Warden asked for a motion to approve the March 10, 2022, Meeting Minutes.

A motion was made by Mr. Paul Buchanan, seconded by Mr. Royce Bennett, and

unanimously approved the March 10th minutes as written.

VI. <u>U-6065 – Scope Modification</u>

Ms. Deanna Trebil discussed the proposed U-6065 Scope Modification at US 17/NC 172 intersection which represents a high priority for safety improvements.

Ms. Deanna Trebil explained that the original design for the intersection corresponds to a Green-T type intersection, which at first formed part of the safety project W-5203T. However due to limited funding, the project was then redesigned as a superstreet and then later incorporated into U-6065 once additional funding was available in SPOT 4.0. However, as a consequence of ongoing safety issues and funding constraints causing delays to the U-6065 project, NCDOT installed a temporary signal at the US 17/NC 172 Intersection. Since the signal has been installed, the number of crashes occurring at this intersection has declined, which was the original intent of the W-5203T project. As a result, NCDOT is now re-evaluating the scope of the U-6065 project.

For this reason, NCDOT is requesting support to upgrade the temporary signal to a permanent one at US 17/NC 172, install a signalized left over rather than a Green-T at SR 1518 (Old Folkstone Road)/US 17, and forego constructing the connecting road between NC 172 and SR 1518 (Old Folkstone Road).

A motion was made by Mr. Paul Buchanan and seconded by Mr. Randy Thomas to recommend Approval of Resolution of Support that was approved unanimously by Committee members present and virtual.

Discussion Items

VII. 2024-2033 STIP

Ms. Deanna Trebil informed the committee attendees about the recent publication of the Draft STIP 2024-2033 by the NCDOT for which the use of existing projects that are not funded, instead of adding new projects, is being considered.

First, Ms. Deanna Trebil, shared the timeline for the 2024-2033 STIP as follows:

- Spring 2022: Release of the Draft STIP,
- Winter 2022: Release of Revised Draft STIP,
- Summer 2023: Adoption of Final 2024-2023 STIP by the Board of Transportation.

Secondly, key changes about the STIP were highlighted as a result of current financial challenges and the need to improve the project's cost estimates. These changes correspond to the calculation of cost estimates based on express designs which allow for more accurate values, the update of costs estimates every two years and appropriating contingency funds at each stage of the project development process.

Moreover, the budgeting process will be made accordingly to the "Real Time Cycle" Scheme which is comprised by five phases: Definition of the baseline budget, tracking of

the projects every six months, calculating the delta difference between the budget and the project cost, cost revisions and adjustments, and finally, the addition of those adjustments to the STIP.

Finally, Ms. Deanna Trebil informed the attendants about the nine projects on the Draft 2024-2023 STIP projects that are currently funded and are ready to move forward to implementation. These projects are identified below:

In a similar manner, Ms. Deanna Trebil highlighted the projects that are eligible for swapping from the 2024-2033 Draft STIP, which correspond to a total of 16 projects. The ground rules of project swapping were explained to the members present including the concurrence of the Division and the MPO/RPO, the requirement that the project to be swapped in to the STIP has to be 110% less than the original project, and that it has to be in the same STI funding category. Subsequently, Ms. Deanna Trebil encouraged members to discuss what projects they would like to see get funded and a brief discussion on the projects that are not currently funded was held. Among them, Chairman Bob Warden referred to project U-5716 which is an intersection known for its safety concerns. Finally, Mr. Chad Kimes from NCDOT explained some characteristics and challenges of the upcoming P.7 reprioritization process.

To conclude, Ms. Deanna Trebil, reminded attendants about the upcoming TAC meeting to be held in August and informed them about the possibility to call for a special meeting in order to discuss the projects to be swapped before the NCDOT deadline in September.

VIII. Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Campaign

In the JUMPO planning area, while crashes involving pedestrians and bicyclists only represent 1.2% of all crashes, they account for 20.6% of fatalities. This can be explained due to the fact that pedestrians and cyclists are vulnerable road users as they have less protection and mass compared to motorized vehicles. Therefore, Ms. Deanna Trebil informed the attendants about the new JUMPO initiative to reduce fatalities and serious injuries of non-motorized users within its planning area "Alert Eyes Save Lives".

"Alert Eyes Save Lives", which is currently under development, is a pedestrian and bicycle

safety campaign that aims to make our roads safer for all road users. This goal can only be achievable with the cooperation and joint efforts of multiple sectors. Therefore, the three E's of Effective Planning, "Education, Engineering, and Enforcement," will be key action areas in this effort.

In this way, the education component of this campaign focuses on conveying the message of vigilance and alertness "Alert Eyes Save Lives" through the creation of digital and printed material. At the same time, it will encourage safety behaviors and educate on specific laws that guarantee the safety of all road users. Although the campaign will be carried out primarily with the support of the City of Jacksonville, the message will be adaptable to all the towns and urban areas of the region.

The engineering component aims to understand where, how, and why crashes occur to help prevent them. For that reason, this action area focusses on carrying out a high-level safety analysis to identify crash patterns and high crash locations to prioritize areas for safety improvements.

Finally, the enforcement component of this set of actions, will be the collaboration with local enforcement bodies to target specific common risky behaviors identified in the safety analysis to enforce pedestrian and bicyclist safety behaviors and raise the awareness of all road users when walking, cycling, or driving.

IX. Scenic Byways

NC Scenic Byways is a NCDOT program that promotes the state's landscapes, history, and culture by taking advantage of our existing roads. Currently, there are 62 Scenic Byways in North Carolina. However, there are none within Onslow County despite all the touristic features that the County has to offer. For that reason, Ms. Deanna Trebil shared that JUMPO is evaluating the possibility to submit an application to designate a route within Onslow County as a Scenic Byway.

Mr. Prinz highlighted this opportunity as a way to promote tourism within the region at a minimum cost. Some of the main benefits of the designation is that it allows the diffusion of the tourist qualities of the chosen route. These routes are published in the annual "North Carolina Byways" magazine and on the NCDOT website, thereby providing visibility of the ride throughout the state.

Finally, Mr. Prinz shared a sketch of what the route could look like within Onslow County which included a drive from Swansboro all the way to North Topsail Beach, passing through Jacksonville. This outline contemplated multiple tourist qualities accessible mainly from NC24 and US17 such as Lejeune Memorial Gardens, Hammocks Beach State Park, Surf City Bridge, Swansboro Historic District along with other military and recreational points of interests.

Reports/Comments

X. Report from TAC Secretary

Ms. Deanna inform the presents about a funding opportunity for the R-5885A culvert replacement project on NC 14 (West Corbett Avenue). This funding opportunity came from the Defensive Community Infrastructure Pilot Program (DCIP) which allows state and local projects to overcome infrastructure deficiencies in support of a local military installation in order to enhance military value, installation resilience and military family quality of life.

Therefore, JUMPO is working closely with NCDOT and military stakeholders to prepare an application for a total of three projects (U-5735, U-5508, U-5885A) under the title of "Resiliency". The cost match of the grant opportunity is 70/30 with a total cost of the eight million dollars for the three projects combined.

XI. Report from NCDOT Division 3

Ms. Adrienne Cox shared a list showcasing current projects and under construction within JUMPO. Additionally, she updated the members about contracts that have been recently let which are mostly maintenance in nature such as trip removals, landscaping, ADA curbs. She also let the members know that if citizens are interested in getting information about these topics, they are not projects but constant upgrades and maintenance.

Finally, Ms. Adrienne Cox shared some updates about resurfacing projects which include three contracts that are almost finished, one that is halfway done and a last one that is expected to be out in March 2023.

XII. Report from NCDOT Transportation Planning Division

Ms. Saman Jeffers referred to the most recent headlines of the NCDOT Transportation Planning Division (TPD) Newsletter. Among this news are the 2022 Powell Bill Program which a link to its participation requirements and expenditure guidance was provided.

Furthermore, important deadlines were mentioned to the members such as the last day to submit the adopted FY 2023 UPWP due on May 16, 2022, and the last day to submit the revised FY 22 PWP on June 29, 2022.

XIII. Report from FHWA Field Officer

First, Mr. Bill Marley shared with the attendants the new telework agreement that has taken place within FHWA offices and informed that a new planner has join them to support with MPO duties. Secondly, he notified about recent Notice of Funding Opportunities (NOFO) which he encouraged JUMPO staff to review.

XIV. Closing Comments

Chairman Bob Warden asked for further comments or questions.

Mr. Chad Kimes referred to the Board of Transportation Meeting which will be held the first week of October.

Chairman Bob Warden thanked everyone for their participation in today's meeting. A motion was made by Mr. Paul Buchanan and seconded by Mr. Royce Bennett to adjourn the meeting. The meeting was adjourned at 4:19 pm.

This increase would allow the MPO to hire a consultant to develop a circulation and access plan for the Town of Holly Ridge along the US 17 corridor near NC 50 (Holly Ridge Industrial Park).

Due to the delay in the release of the new urbanized areas from the Census 2020, no work has begun yet on the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP). As such, this funding has been reduced.

The PL104 budget remains unchanged at a total of \$300,125. No additional funding is being requested at this time.

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Introduction

The Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) outlines planning activities for the Jacksonville MPO during the fiscal year using funds provided by federal and state transportation agencies as well as the City of Jacksonville and Onslow County. The UPWP is adopted prior to the beginning of the fiscal year and serves as the program for coordinating MPO activities with the goal of developing an integrated program that addresses current and future mobility needs of our region. Many tasks contained within the UPWP are required by federal or state law and are ongoing. Some of these reoccurring tasks include conducting Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) and Technical Coordinating Committee (TCC) meetings, maintaining a current Metropolitan Transportation Improvement Program, long-range transportation planning and implementing our Public Participation Plan. Other planning initiatives contained within the UPWP vary from year-to-year. For instance, the scope of special projects completed by the MPO to address specific areas of transportation concern (such as small area plans, modal plans or corridor studies) change on an annual basis. This document blends ongoing and year-to-year activities into a cohesive program that builds consensus among federal, state, and local stakeholders regarding MPO operations and budgetary needs.

This UPWP has been developed in accordance with the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act or FAST Act, which requires a planning process that is continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive for making transportation investment decisions in metropolitan areas. The FAST Act also encourages MPOs to consult with planning officials responsible for other types of planning activities affected by transportation, including areas pertaining to land development, environmental protection, economic development, etc. The Jacksonville MPO strives to maintain a cooperative relationship with all of our local planning partners by including them as members of our TCC. Understanding that transportation issues impact all of these areas of concern, MPO staff works to balance these needs throughout our planning process.

The FAST Act requires the metropolitan planning process to provide for consideration of projects and strategies that will:

- 1. Support the economic vitality of the metropolitan area, especially by enabling global competitiveness, productivity, and efficiency;
- 2. Increase the safety of the transportation system for motorized and nonmotorized users;
- 3. Increase the security of the transportation system for motorized and nonmotorized users;
- Increase the accessibility and mobility of people and freight;
- 5. Protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve the quality of life, and promote consistency between transportation improvements and State and local planned growth and economic development patterns;
- 6. Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system, across and between modes, for people and freight;
- 7. Promote efficient system management and operation; and
- 8. Emphasize the preservation of the existing transportation system; and
- 9. Improve the resiliency and reliability of the transportation system and reduce or mitigate stormwater impacts of surface transportation; and
- 10. Enhance travel and tourism.

Each work element within the UPWP satisfies at least one of these ten factors. Further, planning activities associated with each work element emanate from and support the goals of the Jacksonville Metropolitan Planning Organization's 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan.

Citizen involvement is a vital component of FAST Act compliance. As such, resources and activities have been included in this UPWP to implement the Jacksonville MPO Public Participation Plan. As a component of our Public Participation Plan, the Jacksonville MPO website will be maintained on a regular basis to broadcast information on MPO activities and to encourage community involvement in the MPO process. The MPO will also proactively notify citizens of plans and activities on a regular basis through public notices, press releases, social media, virtual public involvement tools, and other commonly used media outlets and public presentations.

All MPO plans and programs comply with the public participation provisions of Title VI which states: "[n]o person in the United States shall, on grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance."

Funding the Jacksonville MPO is a collaborative effort among federal, state and local transportation stakeholders. The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) provide 80% of MPO operating funds, the North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) Public Transportation Division (PTD) typically providing 2% and local MPO member agencies (City of Jacksonville and Onslow County) provide 18%.

FHWA funds (commonly known as Section 104 PL) are administered by the NCDOT Transportation Planning Division (TPD) and require a 20% local match. Section 104 PL funding levels are based on FAST Act authorization. The North Carolina Section 104 PL funding apportionment is distributed to MPOs by the TPD through a population-based formula.

Metropolitan Planning Program funds from the FTA (commonly known as Section 5303) are intended to provide assistance to urbanized areas for planning and technical studies in support of public transportation services. The North Carolina Section 5303 funding apportionment is distributed to MPOs by the NCDOT PTD through a formula based on transit operating statistics. Section 5303 funds require a 10% local match, provided by the City of Jacksonville, and a 10% state match, provided by PTD. Section 5303 funding levels are also based on FAST Act authorization. Revenues for this work program reflect the Fiscal Year 2023 authorization from PTD.

II-A Data and Planning Support

II-A-1 Networks and Support Systems

- Traffic Volume Counts
 - MPO staff will collect traffic count data on a regular basis. NCDOT traffic counts will be used to supplement the counts collected by staff.
- Vehicle Miles of Travel (VMT)
